The Spirit:

Philippians 4:8 (NKJV)

The Bible encourages us to reflect on anything possessing these attributes continually. We must persist in contemplating them. Let me ask you: What are your predominant thoughts these days? Are you mindful that your predominant thoughts wield power over you? Indeed, the body is subservient to the opinions and thoughts of the mind.

Engage your mind with lovely thoughts. Aspire for success in life? Then, dedicate your mental energy to thoughts conducive to success. To achieve success, banish thoughts of failure from your mind, for what occupies your thoughts ultimately shapes your reality. As we've already established, our imaginations and thoughts pave the path to our destiny.

In Romans 8:5-6 (NKJV), Paul asserts, "For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit, the things of the Spirit. For to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace." This passage succinctly conveys that individuals guided by the Holy Spirit prioritize spiritual matters over worldly ones. Similarly, 2 Corinthians 4:18 shows the importance of focusing our minds on heavenly realities rather than earthly concerns, showing the transient nature of earthly things compared to the eternal nature of heavenly ones. Colossians 3:1-2 further emphasizes this principle, urging believers to seek heavenly things in alignment with their spiritual rebirth in Christ.

The Scriptures caution against becoming attached to worldly desires. In 1 John 2:15-17, John admonishes believers not to harbor affection for the world or its pleasures. He warns that worldly desires—such as the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life—originate from the world, not from God. Loving the world and its pleasures can distort our mindset, diverting our focus from the world of God to the things of the world.

By heeding these teachings, believers are encouraged to cultivate a mindset centered on spiritual values rather than worldly distractions. This entails consciously redirecting our thoughts and affections towards eternal truths and divine principles, allowing the Holy Spirit to guide our priorities and pursuits. For instance, indulging in pornography can lead to deeper involvement in sexual immorality, such as fornication and masturbation. Mindset encompasses the assumptions, methods, or beliefs individuals or groups hold, shaping their approach to life and guiding their actions. It plays a crucial role in determining whether we choose to act by following moral principles or not. A positive mindset predisposes one toward constructive behaviors, while a negative mindset inclines one toward destructive actions. It's

essential to recognize that every person possesses free will, granted by God, without imposition. However, this freedom comes with accountability, as our choices and thought patterns are under divine observation. Ultimately, we must foster positive thinking and make righteous choices to align with the prospect of experiencing divine rewards. In Deuteronomy 30:19 (NLT), the Lord said, "Today I have given you a choice between life and death, blessings and curses. Now I call on heaven and earth to witness the choice you make. Oh, that you would choose life so that you and your descendants might live!".

When we make choices with good intentions, aligning our actions with what is right, it sets the stage for blessings from God. Alternatively, when misguided intentions drive our decisions, they invite negativity and adversity into our lives. This highlights the importance of steering clear of harmful mindsets to foster success.

Negative thought patterns act as barriers to progress, hindering our advancement. Addressing and overcoming these mental obstacles is essential; otherwise, our lives risk stagnation. Often, it's not external forces like the devil that

thwart our progress but our misguided perspectives. It's these flawed mindsets that eventually lead some individuals to failure.

Below are some killer mindsets that must be avoided at all costs lest our lives be ruined.

1. Dependency Mindset

In this state, individuals rely solely on others for survival, failing to take charge of their own lives. This dependency often leads people to place their trust entirely in humanity rather than divinity. As Jeremiah 17:5 warns, there's a spiritual consequence to putting one's trust in fellow humans and making them the sole source of hope.

"Thus says the Lord: "Cursed is the man who trusts in man And makes flesh his strength, whose heart departs from the Lord. For he shall be like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see when good comes but shall inhabit the parched places in the wilderness, in a salt land which is not inhabited." - Jeremiah 17:5-6 (NKJV)

A dependency mindset can be detrimental to realizing one's visions and goals in life. While it's natural to rely on parents or guardians for necessities like accommodation, food, shelter, and security during certain stages of life, continually depending on them is not conducive to personal growth and development. While seeking assistance from others is acceptable, we must set boundaries and prioritize our reliance on God rather than solely on human support.

Furthermore, it's not just external dependence that hinders personal development; relying solely on our strengths and abilities without acknowledging God's help can also limit our advancement.

"My flesh and my heart fail; But God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever." - Psalms 73:26 (NKJV)

In 2 Samuel 15, we witness Absalom, David's firstborn son, scheming to usurp his father's throne and establish himself as king over Israel. I refrain from allowing friendships or materialistic pursuits to divert my attention. Even if invited by a fellow preacher for an engagement that lacks divine guidance and may disrupt my focus, I respectfully decline." Here, we witness the disciplined commitment of a revered spiritual leader who recognizes the importance of focus, a quality instrumental to his exceptional success in ministry. He stands as a respected figure, embodying the understanding that focus is paramount for success, which is evident in his remarkable achievements in ministry.

CHAPTER FIVE

To progress in life, it's expedient to shed this egodriven mindset and focus solely on one's journey and the responsibilities necessary for reaching one's goals. Often, individuals are hindered by their preoccupation with ego and reputation, fearing the judgment of others. The desire for societal approval can be a stumbling block, but seeking validation from God alone is paramount.

2. The Bondservant Attitude

"Taking the form of a bondservant." - Philippians 2:7b (NKJV)

The term "bondservant" traditionally denotes an individual in servitude through coercion or voluntary commitment. Within the kingdom of God, it signifies persons who have willingly devoted themselves to Jesus Christ as their sole authority.

The essence of servitude permeated Jesus' life, as evidenced by His words in Mark 10:45, where he stated His purpose: "not to be served, but to serve." This ideology of service was demonstrated in His interactions with His disciples, as He humbly

washed their feet, embodying the humility and selflessness that characterize true servanthood.

"Rose from supper and laid aside His garments, took a towel and girded Himself. After that, He poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel with which He was girded." - John 13:4-5 (NKJV)

Rather than asserting authority as the son of the Living God, Jesus embodied the humble role of a servant. We must adopt this attitude of humility and service towards others, dedicating ourselves wholeheartedly to serving God. One day, the disciples came to Jesus to inquire from Him, the one who is greatest among them. Elijah and Elisha

This account holds valuable lessons applicable beyond its religious context. He did this because of the love and compassion He has for humanity. He loved the world so much that He offered Himself as an atoning sacrifice (1 Timothy 2:5-6) for the remission of the sins of the whole world.

"But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." - Romans 5:8 (NKJV)

He traversed the ups and downs of life much like any other individual, showcasing sympathy for His followers. He shed tears upon witnessing the death of Lazarus (John 11:35), a poignant moment that culminated in Lazarus' miraculous resurrection (John 11:43-44). His heart went out to the masses, likening them to scattered sheep in need of a shepherd (Matthew 9:36). He performed acts of philanthropy and healing, attending to the sick (Acts 10:38) and liberating people from demonic oppression (Matthew 8:16). These instances show His deep understanding and empathy towards human frailty and vulnerability, echoing the sentiment expressed in the book of Hebrews.

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin." - Hebrews 4:15 (ESV)

As Jesus Christ, described as the image of the invisible God in Colossians 1:15, descended from His divine realm to embrace human existence, experiencing the intricacies of earthly life, and cultivating compassion for humanity, we are likewise encouraged to have the same attitude. By adopting Christ's compassionate attitude, we can extend love, empathy, and mercy to others.

Reflects on these scriptural references about love.

"34 A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another. 35 By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." - John 13:34-35 (NKJV)

"Beloved, let us love one another, for love is of God; and everyone who loves is born of God and knows God." - 1 John 4:7 (NKJV)

"Let all that you do be done in love." - 1
Corinthians 16:14 (ESV)

Compassion and love are foundational pillars on the journey to success, as they inherently draw people towards us. Devoid of these qualities, winning the hearts of others becomes an arduous task. ourselves to serve others. He affirmed that true joy does not stem from material possessions but from finding solace and fulfillment in Him.

4. The Spirit of Humility

"...he humbled Himself..." - Philippians 2:8 (NKJV)

Jesus Christ displayed deep humility in all aspects of His life. His ability to offer Himself as a ransom for others (1 Timothy 2:6) and to live among sinners originated from this humility. Despite His divine nature, He willingly followed the instructions of men, showcasing an unparalleled level of humility.

Humility serves as one of the divine keys to unlocking supernatural blessings, as indicated in James 4:6 (CEV): "In fact, God treats us with even greater kindness, just as the Scriptures say, "God opposes everyone who is proud, but he blesses all who are humble with undeserved grace." This biblical principle depicts that humility is essential for spiritual elevation. God's favor and blessings abound for those who embrace humility (Proverbs 22:4), while pride leads to spiritual stagnation (Proverbs 16:18).

Unfortunately, some individuals misuse their positions of authority to assert dominance over others. Such leaders create artificial social hierarchies where wealth, power, fame, and educational status dictate one's worth. This behavior reflects pride and arrogance, contrary to the teachings of Jesus, who called attention to servanthood and humility (Mark 10:42-45).

Jesus consistently showed humility by treating everyone with dignity, regardless of their social status. He humbly interacted with the sick, the poor, children, the elderly, and even those who opposed His teachings, such as the Pharisees, Sadducees, and Scribes.

The following story shows the importance of humility in leadership and the need to treat subordinates respectfully and kindly.

The Humble Manager

In Kumasi, Ghana, a company faced the imminent threat of eviction due to overdue rent, prompting the need for negotiation with the landlord. Despite their financial constraints, the company sought a loan to extend their lease, only to be discouraged by exorbitant interest rates. Relocating posed risks of losing valued clientele, leaving the management in a dilemma. With just two weeks left on their tenancy, the manager, feeling desperate, confided in a trusted cleaner, seeking unconventional advice.

Though initially skeptical about the cleaner's potential insights, the manager explored the possibility, realizing there was little to lose. During a lunch break the following day, the manager candidly conversed with the cleaner, sharing the impending relocation dilemma. Surprisingly, the cleaner revealed a connection to a close associate of the landlord, offering a glimmer of hope.

Together, they arranged to meet the landlord's acquaintance, who facilitated a meeting with the landlord. Through skillful negotiation, they secured an impressive 40% reduction in rent—a significant improvement over the initial hope for a 25% discount. This success, which came partly by the cleaner's intervention, underscored the potential wisdom and resourcefulness in unexpected places.

The experience served as a reminder of the value of acknowledging and leveraging diverse perspectives, regardless of perceived status or position within an organization. Had the manager dismissed the cleaner's input, the outcome may have been vastly different, stressing the importance of openness to unconventional solutions and the potential hidden talents within every individual.

A cleaner facilitated a negotiation that seemed impossible for the top management. We must appreciate and acknowledge everyone, regardless of race, creed, status, or religion, and treat them with respect and dignity.

An actual demonstration of humility lies in our ability to align our will with God's. We walk in divine alignment and obedience when we prioritize God's will over our desires. In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus faced the temptation to stray from the Father's will, yet He submitted Himself, saying, "Nevertheless, not as I will, but as You will" (Matthew 26:39c, NKJV).

Many individuals endure numerous challenges because they fail to humble themselves, allowing pride to overshadow their actions. Let go of arrogance and cultivate a spirit of humility. It's one of the keys to success and elevation in life.

5. The Attitude of Obedience

"....and became **obedient** to the point of death, even the death of the cross." - **Philippians 2:8** (NKJV)

A key aspect of Jesus Christ's character that guides us toward success is obedience. His obedience to the will of God enabled Him to fulfill His divine purpose. Jesus showed complete submission to His Father's will, stating, "I can of Myself do nothing. Peter's Obedience to Jesus' Direction

"But Simon answered and said to Him, "Master, we have toiled all night and caught nothing; nevertheless at Your word I will let down the net." And when they had done this, they caught a great number of fish, and their net was breaking. So they signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink." - Luke 5:5-7 (NKJV)

Jesus taught by the Sea of Galilee as usual, and afterward, He instructed Peter to launch out into the deep. Peter, obedient to the Master's voice, experienced the desired result. Despite toiling all night prior, they had caught nothing. The story shows the importance of following God's guidance when making decisions, a crucial factor for success in life.

We must emulate Christ in our speech, actions, thoughts, and behavior. Proper alignment with Christ's mindset necessitates adopting His lifestyle. Christ has laid the foundation for us, desiring that we mirror His way of living. This aspiration is achievable through diligent study and application of the Word of God.
